

### **The Coming Saviour**

Advent marks the start of a season for the church, but it also starts a new year within the church's calendar. As for the next 12 month we will journey through the gospel of Luke. Now the seasons of the Church year, such as Advent, Lent and Easter, to name a few, are meant to teach us something that we need to learn about the spiritual life and our relationship with God. These seasons go beyond mere information, and offer us the opportunity to "live into" aspects of our relationship with God, that we might not otherwise choose or even know how to choose.

The seasons of the church year give us a chance to practice some of the key disciplines of the Christian life as a community of faith together. As well, we join with Christians around the world by allowing ourselves to be guided and shaped by common themes. When it comes to Advent, this season gives us the opportunity to practice something that is hard for most of us to do - And that is to be present to the moment, to the now, and to the presence of God right here and now in our daily life.

Now for some of us after years in the Church, we can get used to the noise of Advent, so much so that we no longer notice it. Or if we do, it has ceased to jolt us awake and has become instead a low dull rumble. Like someone who has lived by the train trucks for years, and no long hears the sound of the train. But you see, Advent is meant to jolt us awake. Advent teaches us to be watchful, to be awake, and to be present to the coming of Christ into our world. Not just seeing it as an event that happened way back in biblical times, but now — in the places where we long for, and need his presence in our lives.

This Advent I invite us all to start a new chapter in our journey with God and take a moment each day to see Christ's hope, peace, joy, and love in our lives. Now this could be while you have a cup of tea or coffee in the morning, getting the house ready for Christmas, or just before bed, to simply take a couple of minutes to stop, breath, read God's word and be present to the now, to the coming of Christ in our lives.



## **Do: Peace Pudding**

Find some things around your house that bring you peace. They may be a heat pack that makes you feel better, or a pillow that helps you sleep, or a toy that makes you happy. Put all the items on the floor.

Get on members of your family to close their eyes and count to ten. While their eyes are closed take one item from your 'Peace pudding'. When the person opens their eyes, challenge them to guess which part of your pudding is missing. If they get it right, celebrate them. If they get it wrong, tell them what the missing piece is.

#### Do: Musical statues.

Play the song but have one person pause the song at unexpected points in the song. When the music stops, dancers have to freeze and stop themselves from moving. You can play with rule that people move are out of the game or you can just enjoy celebrating the people who stay still like a statue.


**Talk:** What are some of the things in your life that you love? How does God show us love? How can we show love to God? How can we show love to others?


#### Do: Love heart Christmas ornaments.
