#### Read Matthew 25:31-33

- 1. What is the context of this passage? How does it follow on from the previous two weeks?
- 2. What is the significance of Jesus referring to himself as the Son of Man? (see Daniel 7:13-14)
- 3. What is the significance of Jesus gathering all nations?
- 4. Why would a shepherd need to separate sheep from goats?
- 5. What do you think Jesus means by referring to people as either sheep or goats? Who are the two groups?

### Read Ezekiel 34:11-16

- 6. What does the shepherd promise to do?
- 7. How does this passage parallel what you have just read in Matthew 25:31-33?

### Read Matthew 34-46

- 8. How will Jesus know be able to tell the difference between the sheep and the goats?
- 9. What are the eternal implications for being a sheep?
- 10. What are the eternal implications for being a goat?
- 11. Remembering that what Jesus is saying is in the context of Matthew 25...
  What do you think Jesus is trying to emphasise? Does this mean that good works get us into heaven?
- 12. How can we understand Jesus as both the good and gracious King who leads people into eternal life, and at the same time being the Righteous Judge who sends people into eternal judgement?
- 13. What else stands out to you in this passage?

## Rubber hits the road:

- What does it look like for you to be a sheep that is under the Good Shepherd's care this week?
- How will you stay ready as you await the coming of King Jesus?
